



Walitj Meil (eagle eye) Walk Trail is a 1 km loop which starts at the trailhead in the Castle Rock Day use area just past the Granite Skywalk sign. Follow the trail markers along the edge of the forest up a gentle rise to a view of the Stirling Range (Koi Kyeunu-Ruff). The path veers through forest, then northerly finishing the loop near the **Mighty Marri** tree. Noongar stories, including the legend of bush gossip **Chitty-Chitty** (Willie Wagtail), are told along the way. A 19th century botanist's quote is cited for his description of the Karri as the **Grandest Tree**. A few of the bird species in the Park are highlighted in **Bush Melodies**. An endemic ancient walking worm with 15 pairs of legs is featured in **Relics**. A portion of the remarkable Porongurup timber country was set aside to create part of the Park. A photo of officials and guests who attended the Park opening in 1926 is reproduced in **Declaration** of the Park.

The Wedge-tailed Eagle, a significant Noongar totem, is a symbol of strength, beauty and inspiration showing the way, illuminating the path.

Soaring above the earth  
gliding effortlessly through the sky  
the Eagle offers a unique perspective on country.
